From Pastor Greg Pimlott, Senior Pastor

United Methodist pastors wear a lot of "hats" in the churches we serve. We serve as preachers and confidantes, wedding officiants and grief counselors, leaders of staff and—on occasion—plungers of stopped-up toilets, among many other pastoral roles.

One of the United Methodist pastor's "hats" that I particularly enjoy is serving as the chair of the Lay Leadership Development Committee (for folks who have been around United Methodist Churches for a long time, this is the committee that used to be known as the Nominations Committee). The Lay Leadership Development Committee is responsible for identifying, recruiting, and developing leaders within the congregation. Our most visible task is making sure that the committees and teams in the church are staffed with faithful, talented leaders. We prepare the leadership roster for the upcoming year, which is voted on at the church's annual Charge Conference, the congregational gathering where the essential yearly business of the church is done each year. At Charge Conference, new members are celebrated, deaths are recorded, ministry candidates are endorsed by the congregation, budget items are agreed upon ...and the leadership roster is officially approved.

As the Lay Leadership Development Committee met this fall to prepare the leadership roster, we identified several core responsibilities we wanted to accomplish. One of those was promoting good communication about the leadership structure of the church. We wanted to make sure that everyone at Christ Indianapolis United Methodist Church understood who the leaders were in the different ministry areas of the church; how leaders are chosen; how the leadership structure operates; and how someone could express interest in a church committee or ministry team.

As you continue reading, you'll find a few documents that we hope will be helpful to you in understanding the leadership structure of the church. You'll find information about the committee and team structure of the church; how the nominations process works; and how to express your interest in serving on a committee or team in the church.

Whether in churches or other organizations, leadership structures can sometimes seem mysterious and hard-to-figure out. Most often, that's the result of inadequate communication. We hope this explanation will help make the leadership structure of the church less mysterious and more transparent...and will inspire you to get involved!

The Leadership Structure of Christ Indianapolis United Methodist Church

Christ Indianapolis United Methodist Church has a hybrid leadership structure, including committees and teams. Committees do the administrative work of the church. Generally speaking, members serve a three-year term, with roughly a third of the committee cycling off at the end of every year. This practice, which is spelled out in the United Methodist handbook of denominational policies and procedures called the United Methodist Book of Discipline, ensures that church leaders are provided with periods of rest, helps avoid leader burnout, and allows for many voices and ideas to be heard on a committee over time. It also provides an opportunity for committee members who are nearing the end of their three-year term of service to mentor and train the committee members who have recently joined the committee. Occasionally, a committee member will be asked to serve an additional three-year term if there is a specific missional reason to do so. Here are the administrative committees of the church:

- The **Finance Committee** is responsible for leading the congregation in faithful financial stewardship, for paying the bills, and for ensuring that the money entrusted to the congregation is handled appropriately.
- The Lay Leadership Development Committee is responsible for identifying, recruiting, and developing leaders within the congregation, for recruiting the incoming classes for the church committees, and for preparing the church leadership roster.
- The **Staff-Parish Relations Committee** is responsible for hiring new staff as well as other staff transitions, and for fostering strong communication between the pastor, staff, and congregation. They are also the committee that communicates with the District Superintendent when there is a pastoral change.
- The **Trustees** are responsible for ensuring that the buildings and grounds of the church create a safe and welcoming environment for worship, learning, and fellowship.

Teams are responsible for maintaining the programming life of the church. They lead us in worship, in mission, in outreach, and in growing disciples of all ages. Generally speaking, they do not have term limits, but operate on a "y'all come" basis. If you are interested, you talk to the chair and start showing up to meetings, and they put you to work. Here are the programming teams of the church:

- The **Education Team** is responsible for ensuring that all people in the church, from youngest to oldest, are receiving high-quality and faithful Christian instruction.
- The **Preschool Team** is responsible for working with the Preschool Director to ensure that the preschool maintains the highest standards of excellence in early education.
- The Missions Team and the Outreach Team are responsible for promoting financial connections and service opportunities for acts of Christian mission and outreach, both in our neighborhood and far away.
- The Worship Committee (which is actually a programming team in spite of its name!) is responsible for working with the pastor to organize and carry out inspiring, Spirit-filled faithful worship.
- The Congregational Care Team is responsible for supporting and organizing all the care-giving ministries in the church, such as homebound ministries, acute care by the parish nurse, Stephen Ministry, prayer ministries, and food ministries. (article continues on page 4)

Continued from page 3 In addition to the committees and teams of the church, there are a few additional leadership positions that the Lay Leadership Development Committee has responsibility for:

- The Church Council is made up of the chairs of the committees and teams of the church; the lay leader of the church; the lay members of Annual Conference; the leaders of a number of programs and ministries of the church; the president of each Sunday school class; and the Church Council chair, vice-chair, and secretary. The Church Council is the chief administrative body of the church and is responsible for working alongside the pastor(s) to administrate and make decisions for the church. Church Council meetings are where decisions are made, consensus is affirmed, and communication between committee leadership takes place.
- The **Lay Leader** works alongside the pastor to encourage and inspire the congregation to grow in faith, discipleship, and Christian service. The Lay Leader has a seat and a vote on all the committees of the church.
- The Lay Members of Annual Conference attend Annual Conference, the once-a-year gathering of United Methodists from throughout the state of Indiana. At Annual Conference, United Methodists from every UM church in Indiana gather for worship, fellowship, mission, learning, and to do the annual business of the Indiana Conference. While the number of CIUMC's Lay Members is determined by the number of clergy appointed to the church, there are additional opportunities to be an Equalizing Member of Annual Conference representing the Central District, the region of Indiana that includes the south side of Indianapolis. CIUMC has had members take advantage of this opportunity to serve as an Equalizing Member of Annual Conference in past years, and we anticipate having CIUMC members serving in this way again in 2025.

Do you see something here that you'd like to be part of? Reach out to one of the members of the Lay Leadership Development Committee or call the church office to let us know you're interested. If none of these seem exactly right for you, there are many other groups and ministries in the church that aren't part of the official leadership structure. We'd love to help you find a way to serve!

The Nominations Process at CIUMC

Step 1: In late summer or early fall, the Lay Leadership Development Committee begins meeting to develop the leadership roster for the upcoming year. They discuss which members and friends of CIUMC they have noticed whose faith currently seems to be "on fire." They identify the current needs of each committee or team in the church, and they work to match individuals in the congregation with leadership opportunities on that committee or team that will bless both the church and the individual. If anyone has had someone express interest in serving, they bring that person's name to the committee.

Step 2: Lay Leadership Development Committee members contact potential new members of each committee or team. Most newly nominated members of **committees** will serve a three-year term before cycling off the committee (programming teams operate on a "y'all come" basis, and members tend to remain until they feel called to a different way of serving).

Step 3: The Lay Leadership Development Committee prepares a leadership roster of the people who have agreed to serve on the various teams and committees in the church.

Step 4: The leadership roster is presented and approved at Charge Conference, the annual gathering where the yearly business of the church is conducted.

Step 5: On January 1, the newly elected leaders begin to serve!

A cow would say...

Eat more chicken!

But really, why should we eat more chicken?

Did you know that chicken and it's cousin, the turkey, are high in tryptophan which gives you that comforting feeling after consuming a big bowl of chicken soup or a chicken dinner. If you are feeling depressed, eating some chicken will increase the serotonin levels in your brain, enhance your mood, relieving stress and helping you to sleep.

Remember after a turkey feast or some chicken on Thanksgiving how people often get sleepy and just want a little nap. You can thank a chicken or turkey for that nap.

Other good reasons for eating chicken are several. Here are some of them:

- 1. Bone loss prevention which will help stave off or reduce Osteoporosis.
- Brighten your mood.
- 3. Protein from chicken as well as other meats lends its self to muscle growth
- 4. That same protein may help support a healthy body weight and aid weight loss.
- 5. Eating chicken helps suppress homocysteine level. Homocysteine an amino acid that can cause cardiovascular issues ,stroke high blood pressure and increased anxiety if the levels are high enough. Homocysteine is a chemical produced from consuming of red meat, dairy, processed food, stress, alcohol and smoking
- 6. Chicken is high is phosphorus, an important mineral that supports your teeth, bones, kidneys, liver and the nervous system
- 7. Because of the selenium, another mineral, is involved with immune function
- 8. Chicken also happens to be rich in niacin, on of the B vitamins that guards against cancer and other genetic (DNA) damage
- 9. Poultry also is high in vitamin A, which is vital for health eyes.
