Hope Helps Prevent Suicide: Chances are you know someone who has died by suicide or has had suicidal ideations or attempts. Maybe, you have had suicidal ideations or attempts, maybe you are feeling this way now. Suicide is a tough topic, one we often refrain from talking about because we don't know what to say, how to say it, or we are fearful of what the answer will be. We must end the stigma associated with suicide and mental health. When we know better, we do better. Suicide is the third leading cause of death for teenagers in Indiana, and 1 in 5 high school students have seriously considered suicide. Overall, the suicide rate in Indiana has been higher than the national average for the last six decades.

On November 20, Damon Cox will host a QPR (Question, Persuade, Refer) training at 6:30pm. QPR is an evidence-based program designed to provide its participants with information on how to prevent a suicide in three easy to remember steps.

From Pastor Greg Pimlott, Senior Pastor



Having said that, it is also true that the Good News of the Gospel of Jesus Christ is not dependent on whether the church's current pastor has ever met the people being remembered on a particular All Saints' Sunday. Salvation through faith in Jesus Christ is the same in every church, in every community, and in every nation throughout the world. On All Saints' Sunday, we will remember the saints of our church who have died in the past year, but even moreso we will celebrate the radical grace of God made available to each of us through the life, death, and resurrection of Jesus. I look forward to worshiping with you on the first Sunday of November, as we remember those whom we have loved and died—and as we celebrate Jesus, Who died for us and rose for us out of His great love for us.

Operation Christmas Child



What is Operation Christmas Child? The Samaritan's Purse project Operation Christmas Child collects shoebox gifts filled with fun toys, school supplies and hygiene items—and delivers them to children in need around the world to demonstrate God's love in a tangible way. For many of these children, the gift-filled shoebox is the first gift they have ever received.

Since 1993, Operation Christmas Child, the world's largest Christmas project of its kind, has collected and delivered more than 220 million shoebox gifts to children in more than 170 countries and territories. Anyone can pack a shoebox. Individuals, families, churches and groups fill empty shoeboxes with school supplies, hygiene items and fun toys, such as dolls or soccer balls.

Our boxes are due on Sunday, November 10th. Please turn in the box to the display in the education wing.

To learn how to pack a shoebox, view gift suggestions, get your Follow Your Box label and more go to samaritanspurse.org/occ.

Participants can offset the shipping cost by donating \$10 per shoebox gift online through Follow Your Box and

receive a tracking label to discover its destination.

Last year, our church sent 122 shoeboxes and are hoping for more this year! SCOPE:

- Shoebox gifts are collected in Australia, Austria, Canada, Finland, Germany, New Zealand, South Korea, Spain, Switzerland, United Kingdom and the United States.
- More than 11.3 million shoebox gifts were collected globally in 2023, 10 million from the United States alone. Operation Christmas Child hopes to collect enough shoeboxes each year to reach another 12 million children.
- Over 540,000 volunteers worldwide- with more than 213,000 of those in the U.S.- are involved in collecting, shipping, and distributing shoebox gifts.
- Operation Christmas Child is a project of Samaritan's Purse, an international Christian relief and
 evangelism organization headed by Franklin Graham. Samaritan's Purse currently works in more than
 100 countries to provide aid to victims of war, disease, disaster, poverty, and famine. In the past
 month, they have been working alongside victims of Hurricanes Helene and Milton, both in North
 Carolina and Florida; where they have multiples disaster relief bases.

- Delivered into the hands of children through local churches, every shoebox gift is an opportunity to share about Jesus Christ and God's love.
- Since 2009, over 40.5 million shoebox recipients have participated in our 12-lesson discipleship
 course, The Greatest Journey. More than 20.2 million boys and girls have made decisions for Christ.

Pumpkin Pie Play Dough

Ingredients

- · 1 cup flour
- $\cdot \frac{1}{2}$ cup salt
- · 2 tablespoons cream of tartar Instructions
- · 1 teaspoon pumpkin pie spice
- · 1 tablespoon oil
- · 1 cup boiling water
- · Food coloring orange or yellow



- 1. Combine flour, salt, cream of tartar, and pumpkin pie spice in a small bowl.
- 2. Combine boiling water with the oil and food coloring.
- 3. Stir wet ingredients into the dry ingredients and mix well.
- 4. Remove from bowl and place on a cutting board or parchment paper.
- 5. Knead dough until it's well combined and no longer sticky, add more flour a teaspoon at a time if it's sticky.
- 6. Store in an airtight container.

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Our Focus on Missions

Zanmi Fandwa-Project Rouj is dedicated to helping families find stability through housing, education, and economic development. We believe that if a family has a safe home, this creates stability, and stability creates space for families to dream about a new future. Our goal includes providing jobs for Haitians by building 20 homes each year. Each project creates 15-20 jobs. By the end of 2024, we hope to have built 100 houses. Each of these houses cost about \$10,000 to build. The families who are recipients of the houses do not receive them for free. There are certain guidelines that they must meet. They must own their

own land; participate in seminars led by Fondwa community leaders in subject areas such as wellness, financial planning, food and nutrition, and environmental care; complete 200 hours of sweat equity in building homes with Pwogram Kay; and they are required to make 36 monthly payments toward the cost of their home. 15 of these payments must be made in order for construction to begin. Fletcher Place Community Center Preschool:

With the knowledge that education is the best tool to break the cycle of poverty, FPCC has been expanding our REACH Early Learning (EL) program. REACH EL is an affordable, diverse Paths to Quality Level 3 early learning program for children ages 6 weeks to 5 years. REACH EL offers opportunities for scholarships to children while supporting their parents to gain valuable education and training in alignment the 2Gen Poverty model in partnership with Southeast Community Services (SECS) Center for Working Families. Having REACH EL housed within FPCC allows us to provide our immediate need services to families creating a supportive "family village" that aids in breaking the cycle of poverty.

IN UMC Children's Home-Lebanon Launching a new project!

The Independence Project, is a pilot program for independent living designed for 18-and -older kids who have aged out our our current program and feel they need extra help to get on their feet; it offers second chances when they stumble. Some of the items that will be addressed are: getting driver's licenses, learning to budget, practicing job interview skills, college applications, engaging with churches and therapy, finding safe housing, and they will meet with caring adults who can help them navigate thru these things. After renovating apartments, we will launch the program with 6 participants.

Journaling for body, mind and soul,

"Do you not know that your bodies are temples of the Holy Spirit who is in you, whom you have received from God? You are not your own. Corinthians 6:19



There are many ways to care for Your Temple (Body, mind and soul). Some of those ways are good nutrition, enough sleep, drinking water, laughing and praying, and journaling.

Our Focus here is journaling. Journaling can help you feel more in control of your emotions and less stressed. The emotional impact of traumatic events can be mitigated by the therapeutic process of writing about one's thoughts and feelings regarding the event.

Studies have indicated that journaling and other forms of expressive writing can help alleviate stress, despair, and anxiety.

Journaling is the act of recording thoughts; feelings concerns and any other ideas that pass through your mind. Ways to do that are writing with pen and paper, drawing things out, recording one's voice or video. Writing/journaling effects both the left and right side of the brain and is thought to improve communication across areas of the brain responsible for regulating emotions. By sharing information across brain regions, we may be able to better recognize and control our emotions.

Writing down one's thoughts and feelings in a journal might help one gain perspective on their feelings and see repeating cycles or triggers.

Journaling has been shown to improve not only emotional health but also mental agility and long-term memory.

A bonus to this type of journaling is the physical aspect of this activity. An overabundance of stress can be damaging to your physical, mental and emotional health. Journaling is an incredible stress/anxiety/grief management tool. One study showed that expressive writing, (like journaling) for only 15 to 20 minutes a day three to five times over the course of a four-month period was enough to lower blood pressure and improve liver functioning. The American Medical Association states that stress is the basic cause of more than 60% of human illness and disease

Just remember you don't have to be Shakespear, Thoreau, John Grisham or a sportswriter to journal. The practice of journaling is private writing for yourself. It may help maintain the temple that you are. It is a personal choice for your benefit and may assist in cultivating peace of mine.

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Fish Fry Recap

The CIUMC 2024 Fish Fry (36th Annual) was a great success. The Outreach Committee and Fry Fry leaders would like to give a big thanks to the congregation for their support of the Fish Fry through their attendance, donations of pies, soda and water, and especially to those who volunteered many hours of their time to help make this annual event possible and successful. Our total sales were approximately \$27,000.00 and the expenses were approximately \$11,500.00, for a net profit of approximately \$15,500.00. We had record sales this year, and the profit was almost identical to last year's fish fry.

As you have probably heard, even though we ordered more fish and tenderloins than last year, we ran out of both with several hours to go. We ran out of tenderloins at 1:00 p.m. and fish at 3:00 p.m. So, we will order more next year and have more sales, and, hopefully, more profit. We got rave reviews of the quality of our food and value of our \$10.00 meal price. Special thanks to Chip Huckaby of Huckaby's Smokehouse BBQ for making our baked beans and potato salad and providing us with several gallons of breading mix specially created for our fish and tenderloins.

Our inside dining was more popular than ever this year, and deliveries and drive-thru were as big as ever. Inside dining allows guests to visit more with each other, and with our church members and pastor, and offers the additional menu options of pie and soft serve ice cream. We were also entertained by group of dulcimers led by our own Bill Banker. Our volunteers who served the public in drive-thru, inside dining, carry-out and delivery displayed gifts of cheerfulness and hospitality, and many of our customers mentioned how much they looked forward to our annual fish fry.

Kudos and thanks to all who made this great outreach event of the church possible. Proceeds from the fish fry go toward organizations helping "the last, the least, and the lost" and "strangers" in our community including homeless families and youth, immigrants and refugees, and our church's own outreach programs including Andrew's Harvest food pantry, Easter Eggstravaganza, VBS, Back to School Splash, and IMPD roll-call meals.
